PRESIDENTS REPORT

Hello Members

It was lovely seeing so many of you at the Annual General Meeting on Sunday and the warm congratulations I received for becoming President. Sadly no one curtsied. I'm looking forward to the 2024 committee's first meeting next week where we get to know each other and commence the preliminary planning for events in 2024 and setting our committee meeting dates.

Those of you who've served on the committee and run events know all too well how much work goes into the planning and execution of events, and it was wonderful to get sincere offers from ex-committee members to assist as a second pair of hands. Narelle DeBoos asked if people could assist without being on the committee and a few others also volunteered - even to the extent of finding a venues and pricing etc. Amazing that the members are pitching in. I especially thank Narelle for the huge amount of work that she put into the AGM and the Booze and Blues events, along with her friends and fellow members Sue & Bill Spicer and Geoff and Jacki Hill.

We moved to Dromana 13 years ago and tootled up to our first annual MPVA wine

show at Red Hill where I saw some assistants in black aprons being unobtrusively very helpful to the winemakers in the hall and the masterclasses - I thought "these people look useful" and joined the FMPV. At that time members could volunteer to assist the winemakers in harvesting small parcels of fruit. I soon was instructed by a winemaker how to assist with the harvest and handed sterilised secateurs and disposable gloves. It was pouring with rain, but a convivial lunch put on for the volunteers took away the shivers and chattering teeth. Nowadays the volunteering is directed to helping the recently renamed Mornington Peninsula Wine with their events. So, we are still being very useful to the winemakers. They have responded by warmly welcoming our club into their wineries and also giving us great deals when we use their wine at events. Only this week the Aylwards donated over two dozen bottles of aged Kooyong Chardonnay to our cellar.

Being on the Peninsula meant that we were immersed in a lot of talk and visits to wineries. When a Dromana colleague said "it's usual for the locals to have a glass of wine at Foxeys on a Friday afternoon", I thought we'd truly found the right place to live!

I wasn't very knowledgeable about the wine I was choosing in the bottle shop but gradually with our wine club I've learned the difference between a nice Pinot Noir and a great Pinot Noir. It was nice to acquire knowledge from friendly, non-judgmental FMPV members. The first time we went to a wine event at Paradigm Hill in co-operation with Eldridge Estate it was eye-opening. Lots of talk about clones and terroir. Sue Sewell kindly sat with us and gave quiet explanations.

I hope you also all make new friends and acquire more wine knowledge.

The 2024 committee is already making enquiries of venues - we're aiming to have a mix of pricing and activities. There'll be firm favourites and new venues. A schedule of events is attached at the end of this Newsletter. As always we appreciate input from the members if you discover a new restaurant that will accept group bookings.

For our first function in 2024 we are having a tasting of a wide range of Portsea Estate Wines from their Portsea and Main Ridge vineyards at the Flinders Golf Club on Sunday 11 February. Enjoy panoramic views over Bass Strait, fabulous food prepared by the Club's renowned chef Shane Smith (ex Paringa Estate), superb wines and great company. A booking notice will be sent out soon but put the date in your diaries now.

PAST PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR 2023

Dear Friends,

This year we organised ten, and successfully held nine events. Your Committee has presented a variety of venues and events, held on weekends where possible, to encourage your attendance.

Our events included a mix of both new events and some of our old favourites. Not everything was supported by sufficient Members to proceed, but overall, we have had a very successful year with more participation by both Members and Guests than in recent years (see table below for details). The mix also included "big" and "small" events as we tried to provide options across the spectrum to try and provide events that met our various Members' preferences. My sincere thanks go to all the Committee Members who were involved in organising the events this year and to all the Members who helped in various ways, both at venues helping with the organisation and volunteering to work on the day.

Our membership at 138 continues to grow and includes 5 life and 6 complimentary members. This year we have also linked up with Frankston Wine and Food Society. Attendance at our events has grown with a number of events during the year exceeding 60 participants. Over 85% of our Members have attended at least one event during 2023. We are seeing our numbers of Members, numbers at Events and our Member participation rate all increase in 2023. Our time of Covid constraint looks to be well behind us and I look forward to FMPV continuing to prosper as we enter our 35th year.

This year there has been a lot of "behind the scenes" activity as the Committee implemented Trybooking as an Event booking tool and expanded the use of Trybooking to cover our subs. This has DRAMATICALLY decreased the effort needed by our Treasurer to reconcile funds coming in to FMPV. It has also made the job of Event organisers easier with information available for dietary constraints and table preferences, when appropriate, and the production of name tags for participants. We are using Mailchimp to do our mailouts to Members. We have implemented an email system which ensures that our records transfer smoothly from person to person as people take on roles within the organisation to ensure continuity of information as explained by Mark Higgins in the September Newsletter. Our website is back to being current. In addition, we have centralised our records "in the cloud" so that we no longer need to provide paper documents to Committee Members. They can now access all documents relating to FMPV whenever it suits them to do so and not rely on keeping paper documents.

Our financial position remains strong under the guiding hand of Glenn Lugg as you will see from the Financial Statements. The Committee with the help of the Cellar master Peter Gillson reviewed the Cellar during the year and made some changes to the Cellar management which Peter will address in his Cellarmaster's Report.

Your Committee continues to function well, with a blend of people who have been on the Committee for some time along with some new additions bringing new ideas. There is always room for new people on the Committee and, with a number of people, including me, stepping down at the AGM, I encourage those who have not been on the Committee to bring their enthusiasm and expertise to it.

On behalf of the Committee and myself, I wish you all a Happy, Safe and Merry Christmas with your families and friends.

Recent Events

24 September 2023 Old vs New Dromana Bay Life Saving Club

Around 55 members and guests attended the event at Dromana Life Saving club and mother nature certainly put on an early summer show with a crystal-clear sunny day. This served to create a magnificent backdrop through the floor to ceiling first floor meeting room right on the Dromana beach. So appealing was the day that we had to drag a few people in from the outside verandah to get the event underway.



The aim for the day was to pull out some cellared FMPV wines and set them up against their most recent vintages to see what differences could be discerned. On hand to give their comments were Michael Kyberd of Kyberd Hills Estate and Darrin Gaffy of Principia Wines.



The wines we compared were the:

2015 Kyberd Hills Chardonnay 2016 Principia Pinot Noir

2021 Kyberd Hills Chardonnay 2021 Principia Pinot Noir

Of course, any time one tries to compare apples with older apples there are a few different factors to consider. For instance:

- Weather differences between the relevant years; climate has a huge effect and is always changing which is no surprise to Melbournians.
- The vines get a little older each year and there is typically a grape quality improvement the older they get especially in a region where many of the vines are not that old.
- Wine making techniques change and improve as the winemakers get to learn the terroir subtleties of their vineyards and how winemaking techniques can be applied to them.
- And finally, like with anything, taste is in the nose of the beholder.













Some folks like to see the fruit shine out in the wines which typically is more apparent in fresher younger wines, especially if they are not "built" for aging; which the vast majority of Aussie wines are not.

Consequently, there were many spirited conversations between the audience and the winemakers, and by the end, no real consensus was achieved. But people thoroughly enjoyed the tastings, discussions and great comments by Michael and Darrin. It is probably true to say that not many attendees came away saying "let's go out and buy a bunch of cases to lay down and drink in 10 years' time" as the differences in the wines tried were not all that significant; but the wines of both vintages in each case were excellent. Wine aging is extremely hard to gauge and many people in the know will tell you to open one bottle every six months and see how it's travelling. If it hits its peak start drinking it or risk sitting on a bunch of over the hill wines.

It turned out to be a well-attended and received event and likely one we will do again. In addition, we discovered a really nice and relatively low-cost venue for holding future events in a pretty central location for most members.

















I also just wanted to mention and thank both Rod and Narelle DeBoos for jumping into the breach in the last few days and saving my bacon as I had to head to an unexpected European meeting. And to Gaye Storey for laying much of the initial groundwork for the event.

28 October 2023 Award for Excellence Lunch Ranelagh Club



Saturday 28th October 2023 saw 57 Friends members and guests enjoying a 3-course lunch with matching FMPV cellar and Polperro wines.



The purpose of the lunch was to present our club Award for Excellence now in its 28th year. This annual award is presented to a person who has made a significant contribution to the Mornington Peninsula Wine Industry. The recipient for 2023 is Sam Coverdale from Polperro, Red Hill. Sam's contribution to the MP wine industry is described below in the remarks made by Tony Sewell in presenting the award.









The wines featured on the day were Stoniers 2016 Sparkling Chardonnay Pinot Noir wine; Moorooduc Estate 2014 McIntyre Chardonnay; Polperro 2022 Estate Chardonnay; Principia 2012 Altior Pinot Noir and a Polperro 2022 Estate Pinot Noir. The final wine served with dessert was a Box Stallion 2012 late picked Prosecco, which was kindly donated by Glenn Lugg.

The Sparkling was served on arrival with canapes of Stuffed Baby Zucchini. Unfortunately, the strong wind did not allow us to venture onto the decking but the lounge area provided a perfect "mingling" area inside the Clubrooms.

Both Chardonnays were served with the entrée of Lemon cured Trout, horseradish

cream, finger lime and micro herbs. The main course was Duck with smoked beetroot puree, candied beetroot, red vein sorrel, orange jus gras and baby spring carrots, served with the two Pinot Noirs. The Polperro 2022 Estate Pinot Noir was an amazing match for this dish. The dessert was a Lime meringue, mandarin curd, freeze dried berries, lemon and mint gel mascarpone, which went well with the Box Stallion prosecco.









The Ranelagh Club in Mt Eliza proved to be an excellent location for the function and Cassandra and the staff on the day provided excellent service and the chef, Nic François excelled with his delicious food.

Tony Sewell's Remarks in Presenting the Award for Excellence

"The FMPV Award for Excellence is given each year to someone who has gained a major award for an outstanding MP wine, has done something special to promote the wines of the MP, or has gained high personal achievement in relation to the MP".

2023 Winner Sam Coverdale, Winemaker – Polperro and Even Keel Wines



Sam Coverdale, along with his wife, Emma Phillips, is the founder and winemaker of Polperro Wines. A local who enjoys what the Peninsula offers, Sam started the winery 15 years ago in his mid-twenties. From an 18-year-old vintage cellar-hand at Tyrells, to a Business and Wine Science degree graduate and student of French winemaker Jean Marc-Lafage, Sam has developed a strong sense of the wine he loves to drink, make and share with fellow wine-loving adventurers.

Working across Australia's wine regions with Hardys, then travelling to Spain, Italy and France before establishing Polperro by Even Keel in 2006, and from 2009 has specialized in premium, single-vineyard wines from the Mornington Peninsula, under the Polperro label. Sam, Brent Osbourne Assistant Winemaker & Vineyard Manager and their team, using a mix of organic and biodynamic principles, has fine-tuned their organic-minded capabilities to create drinkable, balanced and elegant wines that continue to interest beyond the first glass. Surrounded by first-class vineyards and sensational surf beaches, Polperro represents everything that is magical about the Mornington Peninsula and the life Sam and his family enjoys. Sam's technical

grounding and well-rounded experience results in wine that play to the strength of region and authentic climatic conditions of each vintage.

Over the years, the Polperro wines have received many accolades and the 2021 Little Laney Pinot Noir was recently ranked #1 Pinot Noir on the Mornington Peninsula and received 98 points from the Huon Cooke Real Review.

Their Even Keel range offers wines from a wider range of Australian vineyards.

Sam is a member of the MPVA Committee and is actively involved in promotional events for the wines of the Peninsula. In fact, today, he and Emma are involved in an event up in Melbourne and so Georgia Bannister, Trade Marketing Executive for Polperro Wines is here to receive the Award on Sam's behalf.
